**George Bush Presidential Library and Museum – *Treasures of China***

**August 2, 2003 – January 4, 2003**

This unique George Bush Presidential Library and Museum exhibit, which will surround the China-U.S. Relations conference, will broaden Americans' interest in China's ancient history and traditions. It will juxtapose contemporary Chinese art with its ancient counterparts. Thirty exotic paintings will surround Neolithic pottery, Tang sculpture, and jade carvings. The elegance of fluid lines, the exquisite sense of color, and the deft mastery of subject matter seen in Chinese art of the past serve as enduring art forms to major Chinese artists of today.

President Bush's extensive collection of Chinese scroll art, both old and new, will make its debut during this exhibit.

Many of these pieces are valued gifts from Chinese friends dating from Mr. Bush's time in China as the American Liaison to China in 1974 and 1975. Additionally, selected pieces from prominent American collections will be exhibited.
